Broader Horizons Mentees Visit Charleston

Twenty-three students from River View and Mount View high schools participated in the Broader Horizons mentorship program's trip to Charleston on Jan. 10-14. The mentees started the week with a leadership development session led by Christine Campbell, president of AFT-West Virginia. Campbell shared with the students how she became the president of a state federation despite her humble beginnings. Students discussed the qualities they believe make for a good leader and the different ways in which they are leading in their community and schools. AFT staff members Lauren Samet and Julie Washington led two sessions on communications. They trained students on the best ways to deliver an impromptu and an informational speech, as well as on other effective communication strategies—both verbal and nonverbal. Mentees were challenged to write a short speech about their hero; many chose to speak about their parents, other family members or a teacher who inspires them. The speeches were sincere, eloquent and full of personality-often leaving many in the room in tears or laughing. Several students admitted that the communications sessions made them nervous, but in the end they enjoyed them. Nadia Johnson of Mount View High school said, "It's been a learning experience for me to better myself" while Joseph Hayes noted that the trainings made him feel more confident for an upcoming interview.



Handle with Care Program Implemented in McDowell

The West Virginia Defending Childhood Initiative, commonly referred to as Handle with Care, has been implemented in McDowell County. The program was established to address the special needs of students who have witnessed a crime, violence or been subjected to a traumatic experience. The initiative allows police who have been called to a scene where a child is present to alert the school of the child's involvement. No details are shared with the school; the notification simply provides the student's name along with the message "handle with care." Educators are then able to adjust to the student's needs by taking a variety of steps, such as allowing the child to rest, retake a test or to refer the student to a school counselor. Going through a traumatic experience can limit a student's ability to focus, excel academically and can lead to truancy, school failure or being caught up in the juvenile justice system. The program not only facilitates communication between law enforcement and school personnel to provide students the support they need and help to reduce the negative effects of trauma, it also increases school and community partnerships to provide wraparound services and effective interventions. The program was launched on Dec. 10 in Welch where teachers were trained. It has since been fully implemented throughout the County.

The Red Cross Trains Students on Disaster Preparedness

The Pillowcase Project, a great program implemented by the American Red Cross was inspired by students who used pillowcases to carry their belongings in the aftermath of Hurricane Katrina. The project was developed for students in grades 3-5 to train them on disaster preparedness. McDowell County students were educated on the program by representatives of the West Virginia Red Cross, who discussed what was needed to prepare for various natural disasters and other emergencies. The students decorated their pillowcases, learned about other items needed for disaster preparedness and practiced the necessary steps to ensure their safety in emergencies.
