Children's Home Society of West Virginia Seeks Mentors

The Children's Home Society of West Virginia is a nonprofit child welfare organization founded in 1896 to promote the well-being of children. Its WE CAN Volunteer program recruits, trains and makes volunteers available to Child Protective Services to augment its work with children, parents and the community. The society is currently seeking mentors for its WE CAN volunteer mentoring program in both Mercer and McDowell counties. The program serves children ages 4-18. Volunteers may spend a couple of hours a week with their mentees engaging in various activities such as homework assistance and dining out. Community members are encouraged to apply to become a mentor; applicants must be at least 18 and able to pass a background check. Voya Renews Its Grant to Reconnecting McDowell

Voya Foundation—the charitable arm of Voya Financial, a retirement, investment and insurance company has awarded Reconnecting McDowell a \$50,000 grant. The foundation awards grants to nonprofit organizations addressing a variety of community needs and resources, with a focus on children's education and financial education. This grant is the second Voya has awarded to Reconnecting McDowell to fund family literacy centers in the County and our Books on the Bus program. The program will place mobile libraries on two school buses that serve the County. Students will be able to borrow and read the books while in transit to or from school.
