TRANSPORTATION

We will work to find new transportation alternatives, to expand broadband capacity and internet adoption, and to improve cellular phone service—all of which will give members of the community, and particularly the county’s young people, new access to recreational activities, online learning and other services.

- Every middle schools student received a laptop in fall 2015
- Working on “bring your own device” strategy/policy
- 75% of kids from middle schools have access. Need to increase.
- Work on extending bus service to War, laeger, and Bradshaw
- Support efforts to expand transportation in general for student/family access to school and community supports and services.
- Will be launching ‘books on the bus’ where students will have access to brand new books to read during their long commutes

HOUSING

Housing. McDowell County’s shortage of adequate housing is a barrier to recruiting the teachers needed to staff the county’s classrooms. Lack of housing forces young people to look outside the county for places to live when they finish high school. We will marshal public, private and nonprofit group resources to expand McDowell County’s housing opportunities.
